Welcome to 2nd Grade!

Reading everyday over the summer is important to exercise your child's brain to get ready for Second Grade! Students are expected to read daily and a selection of suggested books can be found below. Students are to log the books they read on the Summer Reading Log below. The top three students with the most summer reading minutes will receive a prize. Additionally, your child will read and answer comprehension questions, and are required to keep a summer journal. These assignments together count as a grade towards the first trimester.

1) Writing

Keep a journal over the summer to reflect and share what you did. Students may use the attached Journal template pages. Students are to draw a picture on the bottom to go with their journal entry.

- What/who did you see?
- Where did you go?
- What did you learn?
- What did you do?

You will need to have at least 1 journal entry per week for at least 6 weeks. Each entry should be 2-3 sentences. **Underline your verbs, circle the nouns, and draw a rectangle around the adjectives.**

What is a noun?

A noun is a word that refers to a person, place, thing or event

What is an adjective?

An adjective is a word that describes a noun.

What is a verb?

A verb is an action word.



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What Is a Rainbow? By Rachelle Kreisman



Rainbows sometimes show up on rainy days. Have you ever seen one?

Rainbows appear in the sky only if the sun is shining. Sunlight looks white. Actually, it is made of many colors. Rainbows show off those colors.

Rain comes from clouds. Clouds are made of tiny drops of water. If the drops get too big, they fall as rain.

Sunlight shines through the drops of rain. The drops bend the light. The colors spread out. Then you see a rainbow! A rainbow's top rows are red, orange, yellow, and green. The bottom rows are blue, indigo, and violet.



Rain is falling. Suddenly, you see a flash. Zap! Lightning hits a tree. Next you hear a loud sound. What is happening?

Lightning is electricity. It forms in clouds during a storm. Lightning can go from cloud to cloud. It can also strike the ground. When that happens, lightning takes the shortest path. It hits tall objects. It may hit buildings or trees. It may also hit people.

Lightning is really hot. When it travels, it heats up the air. The very hot air makes a loud noise. That is the thunder you hear. People see lightning before they hear thunder. Why? Light travels more quickly than sound.
